1 Mondriaanhuis Amersfoort

Visit the Mondriaanhuis in Amersfoort, the house where the Dutch painter Piet Mondriaan was born in 1872. This visit will be combined with a guided boat tour through the old town of Amersfoort.

Piet Mondriaan has become world famous as one of the founders of (geometric) abstract art. Travel through his birthplace in Amersfoort and through Mondriaan's life, discover his iconic work, his spiritual education, his interests and friends.

The artist's artistic development passes by and you experience how Mondrian's work gradually changed from realistic landscapes, to luminist scenes to the progressive abstract compositions with the lines and surfaces in the primary colors red, yellow and blue. Including the artistic search that led to the famous 'Victory Boogie Woogie'. Moreover, it becomes clear what influence jazz music, a great passion of the Mondriaan, had on his work. You can also take a look at Mondrian's full-size reconstructed studio from his period in Paris.

2 Rietveld Paviljoen Amersfoort

Visit the Rietveld Paviljoen in Amersfoort, this visit will be combined with a guided walking tour through the old town of Amersfoort.

The Rietveld Pavilion in Amersfoort dated 1959 is one of the most important later works by the Dutch architect Gerrit Rietveld. It is a respected example of functional, business-like building after the Second World War. With its sober, almost Spartan features, the Rietveld Pavilion distinguishes itself internationally for its spatial qualities. At the time, Rietveld designed the building as an exhibition space on the occasion of the seven hundredth anniversary of the city of Amersfoort, which made a major modernization during this period led by mayor Hermen Molendijk.

For over fifty years, the Rietveld Pavilion functioned as the centre for modern art in Amersfoort, with countless national and international exhibitions. Especially with a view to the exhibition "Beyond the style. Gerrit Rietveld and the 1950s. "In 2017, the pavilion was renovated. This renovation of the Rietveld Pavilion and the construction of a park around the pavilion literally put the building in a different light and the spatial qualities come into their own.

3 Dutch paint factory

Visit a traditional Dutch artist paint factory, see the production method of the paints and learn about paint manufacturing in the Netherlands.

Transportation: we will leave from Amersfoort in a group and travel to the factory by train.

4 Ateliergebouw Amsterdam

Join us for a guided tour through the laboratory of the Cultural Heritage Agency of the Netherlands located in the Atelier Building at the Museumplein in Amsterdam. This building is shared by the Restoration ateliers of the Rijksmuseum and the conservation programme of the University of Amsterdam. During the tour you will meet RCE colleagues and learn about our research laboratory and RCE projects. Furthermore we will hear from our partners of the University of Amsterdam and the Rijksmuseum. Transportation: we will leave from Amersfoort in a group and travel to Amsterdam by train and tram.
